Simon's involvement with Back to Back Theatre started in 1999 with his participation in *Theatre Of Speed*. He joined the Ensemble in 2003. He has performed in and co-created works including *Small Metal Objects*, *Lady Eats Apple*, *Ganesh Versus The Third Reich* and *The Shadow Whose Prey* 

The Hunter Becomes, and the feature film Shadow. Simon recently played a lead role of Des in Back to Back's first foray onto the little screen, Oddlands, and played Lucky Phil in Matthew Saville's AFI nominated feature film, Noise.



### Sarah Mainwaring

Sarah joined the Back to Back Theatre ensemble in 2007. She has developed a number of original solo performances including *Foreign Body* (directed by John Bolton) and *I'm Me And I'm OK* and *Out On A Limb* (directed by Lloyd Jones). Sarah played the lead role of Lesley in Back

to Back Theatre's Food Court and has toured both nationally and internationally with The Democratic Set Residency and Lady Eats Apple. Sarah has played a collaborative role in the creative development of Ganesh Versus The Third Reich, Super Discount and The Shadow Whose Prey The Hunter Becomes, as well as the company's first feature film Shadow. Sarah has a Bachelor of Arts (Performing Arts) from Victoria University.



### **Scott Price**

Scott began working with Theatre Of Speed in 2005 and joined the Back to Back Ensemble in 2007. He has co-devised and performed in Food Court, Ganesh Versus The Third Reich, Super Discount, Lady Eats Apple and The Shadow Whose Prey The Hunter Becomes, and the company's feature film

Shadow in 2021. In 2015 Scott co-created the video-blog series *Price* for which Scott interviewed nine Australian and international artists, performers, political leaders and activists. *Price* was a finalist in the 2016 Australian Multicultural Marketing Awards.



### Bruce Gladwin - Director

Bruce Gladwin is an Australian artist and performance maker. He has been the Artistic Director of Back to Back Theatre since 1999, creating *Mental* (1999), *Dog Farm* (2000), *Soft* (2002), *Small Metal Objects* (2005), *Food Court* (2008), *The Democratic Set* (2009), *Ganesh Versus The Third Reich* 

(2011), Super Discount (2013), and Lady Eats Apple (2016). Bruce's works with Back to Back Theatre have toured extensively, including presentations at the world's preeminent contemporary arts festivals and cultural venues. In 2015, Bruce was awarded the Australia Council for the Arts' Inaugural Award for Outstanding Achievement in Theatre.



### BACK TO BACK THEATRE

Based in the Victorian regional centre of Geelong, Back to Back Theatre is widely recognised as an Australian theatre company of national and international significance. The company is driven by an ensemble of actors who are perceived to have intellectual disabilities and is considered one of Australia's most important cultural exporters.

We contend our operation as a theatre company is beyond expectation of possibility: an affirmation for human potential. The company's existence contributes to the richness and diversity of Australian life and palpably projects Geelong, Victoria and Australia to the world as innovative, sophisticated and dynamic.

The company has undertaken presentations and screenings at the world's pre-eminent contemporary arts festivals and venues such as the Edinburgh International Festival, London's V&A Museum and the Barbican, Vienna Festival, Holland Festival and Theater der Welt, the Kennedy Center in Washington DC, the Public Theater in New York, Festival Tokyo, West Kowloon Cultural District Authority in Hong Kong, and Buenos Aires International Festival.

Back to Back Theatre has received 21 national and international awards including the International Ibsen Award, a Helpmann Award for Best Australian Work, an Edinburgh International Festival Herald Angel Critics' Award, two Age Critics' Awards, a New York Bessie and the Sidney Myer Performing Arts Group Award for our long-standing contribution to the development of Australian theatre. In 2015, Bruce Gladwin received the Australia Council for the Arts' Inaugural Award for Outstanding Achievement in Theatre. The ensemble was awarded the 'Best Ensemble' in the 2019 Green Room Awards.

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
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
